Filharmonie Brno

The roots of the Filharmonie Brno go back to the 1870s, when the young Leoš Janáček endeavoured to establish a Czech symphony orchestra in Brno. The works of the famous twentieth-century composer constitute the core of the orchestra's repertory, and to this day the Filharmonie Brno considers itself to be the authentic performer of his oeuvre.

The present orchestra was created in 1956 by merging the Brnobased Radio and Regional orchestras, and since then has been among the leading Czech orchestras in terms of both size and importance. On its tours abroad, it has performed about a thousand concerts throughout Europe, the United States of America, Latin America, and both the Middle and Far East. The Filharmonie Brno is a regular guest at festivals in the Czech Republic and abroad, frequently joining forces for these appearances with the Czech Philharmonic Choir Brno. In the 2022/2023 season, the orchestra toured the UK and the US and visited many renowned venues (Festival Rheingau, Ars Electronica Festival in Linz, Grosses Festspielhaus in Salzburg, Gewandhaus in Leipzig).

The orchestra regularly records for the Czech Radio, Czech Television and a number of music labels (including Supraphon, Sony Music, IMG Records, BMG and Channel 4), and in 2020 founded its own label, Filharmonie Brno. Seven titles have been released on the label so far, and a recording of Philip Glass's 12th Symphony was nominated for an ICMA award in 2022. It is also receiving a growing number of commissions from global clientele through the agency Czech Orchestra Recordings.

Throughout its history, the orchestra has had a number of Czech and international conductors, including Břetislav Bakala, František Jílek, Petr Altrichter, Jiří Bělohlávek, Sir Charles Mackerras, Jakub Hrůša or Tomáš Netopil. Maestro Dennis Russell Davies has been appointed the orchestra's chief conductor and artistic director beginning with the 2018/2019 season.

Since 2000 the Filharmonie Brno has been organising the openair summer festival at the Špilberk castle in Brno, and in 2012 has become the organiser of the renowned traditional festivals Moravian Autumn, Easter Festival of Sacred Music and Exposition of New Music. The orchestra sponsors the internationally lauded children's choir Kantiléna, has been involved since 2010 in the young musicians' festival Mozart's Children, and in 2014 founded the Filharmonie Brno Orchestra Academy.

Today Filharmonie Brno is not only a strong player in the field of symphonic music at home and abroad, but also the primary organiser of the musical season in the second largest Czech city, an active instigator of festivals, creator of a wide range of educational programs and a leader in orchestral programming. Its home is the Besední dům (former community hall), the Brno counterpart to Vienna's Musikverein, built in 1873 according to a design by Theophil Hansen. The orchestra is now looking forward to its new modern concert hall, which is being designed by a team of Tomasz Konior, Petr Hrůša and acoustician Yasuhisa Toyota.

Dennis Russell Davies

Artistic Director and Chief Conductor

Dennis Russell Davies' activities as opera and orchestral conductor, and as pianist and chamber musician, are characterized by an extensive repertory stretching from pre-Baroque to the latest music of our time. Widely considered to be one of the most innovative and adventurous conductors/programmers in the classical music world, Davies has successfully challenged and inspired audiences on both sides of the Atlantic as well as in Japan. He is noted for exciting, well-structured concerts and for his close working relationships with such varied composers as Luciano Berio, William Bolcom, John Cage, Philip Glass, Heinz Winbeck, Aaron Copland, Lou Harrison, Laurie Anderson, Arvo Pärt, Hans Werner Henze, Kurt Schwertsik, Thomas Larcher, Balduin Sulzer, and Manfred Trojahn.

After first appointments as Music Director of the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra and Chief Conductor of the American Composers Orchestra, which he led for 25 years, Davies moved to Europe as General Music Director of the Staatsoper Stuttgart, then Opera Bonn and the Beethovenhalle Orchestra. He subsequently led the Vienna Radio Symphony Orchestra, the Stuttgart Chamber Orchestra, and the Symphony Orchestra Basel. In 2013, during his long and successful tenure in Linz as Chief Conductor of the Linz Opera and Bruckner Orchester, Davies inaugurated the new Linzer Musiktheater. Since 2018 Dennis Russell Davies is Artistic Director and Chief Conductor of the Filharmonie Brno. In Autumn 2020 he assumed the position Chief Conductor of the MDR Sinfonieorchester Leipzig.

Dennis Russell Davies' rich discography includes complete recordings of the symphonies of Bruckner and Philip Glass, Haydn, and Arthur Honegger. With his wife and duo partner Maki Namekawa he has recorded extensively, including works by Mozart, Beethoven, Shostakovich, Philip Glass, and Stravinsky.

Born in Toledo, Ohio in 1944, Davies studied piano and conducting at the Juilliard School in New York. From 1997 to 2012 he was professor for orchestral conducting at the University Mozarteum Salzburg; in September 2020 he became guest professor at the Janáček Academy of Music and Performing Arts in Brno.

With its motto of "Dignity in diversity", the multi-genre international festival ŠTETL FEST affords a glimpse into Jewish culture and history, and this second year takes railway trains as its main topic.

Ludwig van Beethoven's (1770–1827) late string quartets are among the best ever written for this group of instruments. The pages of the autograph of the **Quartet in B-flat major** are presently scattered among five countries, and the Moravian Museum in Brno is part of the collector's story of the fourth movement. First gifted by Beethoven himself, the manuscript changed hands several times until it was eventually acquired by the Petschek family, Jews settled in Moravia; during World War II it ended up in the care of the Moravian Museum. It has only recently been restored to the Petscheks.

Steve Reich's (born 1936) Different Trains refers to a period when the composer was travelling as a child across the United States, while in Europe "different trains" were taking people to concentration camps. In this work, Reich allows the recordings of human voices to be heard, and the melodies played by the quartet are derived from fragments of conversation, as well as the whistles and bells of steam trains.

Škampa Quartet's international reputation was enhanced by an acclaimed 1993 performance at the Wigmore Hall in London, which ensured a 1994–1998 residence during which they played dozens of concerts.

Filharmonie Brno enters its 68th season once again under the leadership of its chief conductor Dennis Russell Davies, for whom it will be the sixth season at the helm of our orchestra. The opening will be spectacular: we will hear Mahler's **Symphony No. 2** in **C** minor "Resurrection", a monumental, feature-long work, which the orchestra and its conductor will also perform a month earlier at a prestigious concert in Rheingau, Germany.

The birth of **Gustav Mahler's** (1860–1911) **Second Symphony** was protracted: it took a full six years after the first movement was written in 1888. The conducting workload during the theatre and concert seasons gradually forced Mahler to move his composing into the summer months. He found a place that provided the necessary peace on the shore of Lake Attersee, where he had a composing hut built, and this was where he completed the Second Symphony in summer 1894. In its message, Mahler is revealed to us as a man who has found God. The work ends with an apotheosis, which is a setting of lyrics by Friedrich Gottlieb Klopstock, which Mahler adapted according to his artistic needs. This final movement later earned the symphony the soubriquet Resurrection.

Known to music lovers principally as the founder and director of the celebrated Czech Philharmonic Choir Brno, with which Filharmonie Brno often collaborates on performances of large vocal-orchestral works, **Petr Fiala** celebrated his 80th birthday on 25 March 2023. Fiala, however, is also a successful composer with more than 200 pieces to his name. A new work commissioned by Filharmonie Brno will be heard in a world-première performance: **Hommage à Leoš Janáček** reflects Fiala's strong, lifelong relationship as both composer and choir director with Janáček's music.

Johannes Brahms (1833–1897) wrote the Concerto for Violin and Cello in A minor, his last orchestral work, in 1887 for Joseph Joachim and Robert Hausmann. Despite the technical virtuosity of the two solo parts, the piece is conceived along lines similar to Brahms's earlier concertos, that is, as a symphonically weighty and ingeniously composed flow of music, in which the two protagonists and the orchestra appear as equal partners. Performing as soloists in the Brahms double concerto will be Roman Patočka, the concertmaster of the Prague Symphony Orchestra and Václav Petr. the concertmaster of the Czech Philharmonic.

Before he became chief conductor of Filharmonie Brno, for a full 15 years Dennis Russell Davies led the Bruckner Orchester Linz. Thanks to frequent performances of **Anton Bruckner's** (1824–1896) works he has penetrated deeply not just into the music of this native of Ansfelden (today a suburb of Linz), but also the particularities and pitfalls it presents to interpretation. He is therefore a renowned Brucknerian conductor and each of his performances of the composer's music offers a powerful experience. He has already conducted the *First*, the *Fourth* and the *Fifth* symphonies in Brno; now we can look forward to the *Sixth*. We will commemorate the Polish-American conductor and composer **Stanisław Skrowaczewski** (1923–2017), a similarly noted interpreter of Bruckner and a friend of Davies for many years, whose 100th birthday falls on 3 October 2023, with a presentation of his composition **Passacaglia immaginaria**.

Vicente Martín y Soler (1754–1806), "the Valencian Mozart", was known in his era for his comic operas on which he worked with librettists including Lorenzo Da Ponte. The opera **Una cosa rara** was written for Vienna, and Mozart used one of its melodies in his Don Giovanni.

Cervantes's novel stimulated **Richard Strauss** (1864–1949) to write a programmatic symphonic poem, **Don Quixote**, a philosophical work that grimaces mockingly at all those people who trudge through life encumbered by illusions.

In 1975, **Luciano Berio** (1925–2003) received a commission from La Scala orchestra to create a piece to open a concert. For the occasion, Berio adapted the final movement of the string quintet **Musica notturna delle strade di Madrid** by the classical composer **Luigi Boccherini**.

The Frenchman **Maurice Ravel** (1875–1937) was born close to the border with Spain and thanks to his mother, who claimed Basque nationality, carried in his heart a passion for Spain from childhood. Alongside the one-act opera *L'heure espagnole* and the famous *Boléro*, the **Rapsodie espagnole** written in 1907 showcases his ability to enter the Spanish musical spirit.

Jiří Pavlica and Hradišťan have been a fixture of our musical culture for decades and always guarantee great artistic quality and inventive and varied programming. Their ability to conduct a dialogue with musicians of various genres and to discover new worlds is likewise unmistakable. Their joint programme with the Kantiléna children's choir and Filharmonie Brno under the baton of Jakub Klecker will carry this spirit, offering not just the show pieces from Hradišťan's repertoire but also premières of new pieces by Pavlica, whose oeuvre bestrides the musical spectrum, from alternative music (often growing from the roots of Moravian musicality) to contemporary classical.

Filharmonie Brno was established as the Brno State Philharmonic on 1 January 1956 and performed its first concert that very day (although not yet under that name). Since then it has held regular New Year concerts, thus symbolically welcoming not just the start of a new year but also celebrating its birthday – in 2024 it will be the orchestra's $68^{\rm th}$. This will be a Year of Czech Music, held regularly in years ending in the number four (due to the high concentration of Czech composers' anniversaries in these years). With our American chief conductor Dennis Russell Davies, we enter 2024 with a characteristically Czech-American programme.

Ever since 1924, when the 100th anniversary of Bedřich Smetana's birth was celebrated, the Year of Czech Music has been held regularly in years ending in the number four, due to the high concentration of Czech composers' anniversaries in those years. Filharmonie Brno has prepared many projects to mark the year. The programme in January is traditional, including works that are firmly established in the repertoire of Czech (and international) ensembles. Participating in their performance alongside Filharmonie Brno will be two distinctive figures from the younger generation of Czech music artists: the violinist Jan Mráček, the concertmaster of the Czech Philharmonic, and our permanent guest conductor Robert Kružík

In 2024, we mark 120 years since the death of **Antonín Dvořák** (1841–1904) and 150 years since the birth of **Josef Suk** (1874–1935). Their music is often programmed back-to-back, not only because in some respects Suk follows on where Dvořák left off, but also because there was a family link: in 1898, Josef Suk took Antonín Dvořák's daughter Otilie as his wife.

Percussionists only obtained their own repertoire over the past century, and this fact informs this concert programme featuring attractive 20th and 21st century pieces. In store for us are the ritualistic **24 Loops**, in which **Pierre Jodlowski** (born 1971) plays with a looper to layer the parts, **Psalmus niger** by the Brno composer **Miloslav Ištvan** (1928–1990), inspired by African music, and two minimalist works by Baltic artists, **Arvo Pärt** (born 1935) and **Raminta Šerkšnytė** (born 1975). The **Concerto for Violin with Percussion Orchestra** by the American **Lou Harrison** (1917–2003) is remarkable composition, perhaps the only one of its kind, during which the percussionists of the Filharmonie Brno and its Orchestral Academy are joined by the unique violin virtuoso **Milan Pala**.

A native of České Budějovice, or Budweis in German, **Vojtěch Matyáš Jírovec** (1763–1850) – known internationally as Adalbert Gyrowetz, **Ludwig van Beethoven** (1770–1827) and **Franz Schubert** (1797–1828) were contemporaries who worked in Vienna at a period when music was still dominated by Classical ideals and forms but a Romantic feeling was slowly creeping in. The creative legacies of the three composers capture this shift well. Jírovec remained a Classical composer; in Beethoven's late works in particular Romantic elements are already present; Schubert is considered essentially Romantic. There is no doubt that the three knew each other; it is said that Jírovec and Schubert were among Beethoven's pallbearers and all three are buried close together in Vienna's Währing. Christoph Prégardien, an outstanding lyric tenor of our time, is particularly acclaimed as a Lieder interpreter, but his extensive repertoire also includes vocal-orchestral works of the 17th to 20th centuries.



Among this season's crucial contributions from Filharmonie Brno to the Year of Czech Music 2024 are major vocal-instrumental works by Jan Novák and Antoine Reicha, two somewhat forgotten exile composers whose music Filharmonie has been trying for some time to bring back to the concert stage and to record (in 2020 it published Reicha's cantata Lenora and in 2022 an album of three symphonic works by Novák).

The neo-Classical **Vernalis temporis** symphonia by Jan Novák (1921–1984) in four movements was written in exile in 1982 for the concert hall in Aarhus, Denmark, then newly opened. In the final choral movement, Novák uses the tune and the Latin lyrics of a Renaissance song by the Danish scholar Morten Børup. The melody is struck every day at midday by the carillon in Børup's home city of Aarhus.

Antoine Reicha (1770–1836) worked from classical forms but incorporated numerous innovations, including in his four large cantatas, a loose cycle of sorts with a humanist message responding to the contemporary situation. The *Requiem* can be seen as a memorial service for the fallen in the Napoleonic wars, *Lenora* as an indictment of these wars, **Der Neue Psalm** as a prayer for peace and the *Te Deum* as thanksqiving for the establishment of peace.

What ties this programme together is the harpsichord, presented in each composition in a different role: as a leading voice of a larger chamber ensemble (Krása), as a solo instrument accompanied by symphony orchestra (Poulenc) and in a concertante part in Weinberg's Seventh Symphony. In all three roles the performer will be Mahan Esfahani (born 1984), an Iranian-American musician and musicologist who lives in Prague, a pupil of the legendary Czech harpsichordist Zuzana Růžičková and one of the world's greatest players on the instrument. He appears on the world's leading concert stages, performs with the top orchestras and often asks contemporary composers to write new works for him (Brett Dean, Bent Sørensen, Miroslav Srnka and many others). His most recent album features harpsichord concertos by Hans Krása, Viktora Kalabis and Bohuslav Martinů, with the Prague Radio Symphony Orchestra under Alexander Liebreich's baton; it was the Gramophone Editor's Choice in February 2023.

Falling on 2 March 2024 is the 200th anniversary of birth of **Bedřich Smetana** (1824–1884), the founder of Czech national music. The concerts that immediately precede this date will offer music not only by the master himself but also by two composers who exerted a substantial influence on him.

During his stay in Gothenburg, Sweden, Bedřich Smetana created a trio of symphonic poems, whose programmes are inspired by famous dramas: Richard III, **Valdštýnův tábor** or **Wallenstein's Camp** (after Friedrich Schiller) and *Hakon Jarl*. The second work was written in 1858–1859; it already reflects Smetana's efforts to imprint a national character on his music – the future author of *Má vlast* was awakening.

Franz Liszt (1811–1886) was a pioneer of the symphonic poem and programmatic music and wrote many virtuoso piano pieces. The second of Listz's two piano concertos was completed in 1856. Cast in a single movement, it moves away from the foundations of classical music, favouring inspiration in poetic forms, rhapsody in particular.

Richard Wagner's (1813–1883) last opera, a "sacred festive drama" full of religious mysticism, is about grievous injury and healing, about the miraculous powers of the Holy Grail, the healing power of the Holy Spear and the curative powers of spring. Thanks to multiple orchestral suites, the music of Wagner's last *Gesamtkunstwerk* lives on concert stages too, and one such arrangement is by the Dutch composer Henk de Vlieger.

The personality and music of **Josef Mysliveček** (1737–1781) is currently attracting increasing attention thanks to the successful movie *Il Boemo*. The composer, who became famous in Italy, won a lot of sympathy from Mozart, a generation younger – the two first met in 1770. In his works, Mysliveček anticipates the "Mozartian" classical style.

Created for the 100th anniversary of the Prague première of Mozart's Don Giovanni, **Suite No. 4 in G major "Mozartiana"** is a distinctive expression of Tchaikovsky's admiration for the earlier composer. The four-movement cycle is an arrangement of Mozart's lesser-known works. Tchaikovsky imbued these pieces with a colourful sound and, in varying degrees, Romantic pathos.

Estonia is a small country with a population little more than one million, and it is therefore astonishing how large a footprint it has in contemporary music. Alongside Arvo Pärt, Erkki-Sven Tüür and Veljo Tormis, **Lepo Sumera** (1950–2000) is one of those who make the country more visible. His *Music for Chamber Orchestra*, composed in 1977 and consisting of a neo-Classical introduction and an extended meditative movement with a concertante part for the flute, promises a memorable experience for the audience.

The orchestra will be spread throughout the hall of Besední dům and the audience will sit among the musicians. The two last symphonic poems of *Má vlast* by **Bedřich Smetana** (1824–1884), whose bicentenary we celebrate this year, were chosen as this project's pilot event.

An essential piece of Czech music, Smetana's Má vlast is a "symphonic gospel", as the composer Vítězslav Novák put it, and is exceptional even by international comparison. The topics which inspired Smetana resonate strongly in the Czech consciousness and as generally intelligible symbols have played an important role in coming to self-awareness by the Czech nation. The topics are mythological, historical and natural. **Tábor** and **Blaník**, with which the cycle ends, are thematically linked with the melody of the Hussite hymn Ktož jsú boží bojovníci. Both pieces will first be dissected in the form of commented excerpts and then heard in their entirety.

This concert, packed with anniversaries, commemorates 100 years since the world première of **Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue** (12 February 1924 at the Aeolian Hall in New York City), 70 years since the first performance of **Erich Wolfgang Korngold's Symphony in F-sharp** (17 October 1954 in Vienna) and 130 years since the birth of **Ervín** (Erwin) **Schulhoff**.

It is also a contribution to the Year of Czech Music 2024, one that poses provocative questions: are we willing to admit the German-Jewish Prague-born Schulhoff, whose mother tongue was German, yet who actively espoused Czech music culture, into the context of Czech music? And what about Korngold, who was born in Brno but left the city at an early age to develop his oeuvre under entirely different influences? Where do the boundaries of what we call Czech musical culture lie?

Two of the compositions to be heard link jazz and symphonic music. Gershwin's *Rhapsody in Blue* was a revolutionary feat in this respect, which "shook first New York City, then the entire country, and ultimately the entire civilised world", as Leonard Bernstein wrote. One of the proofs of the "jazz earthquake", even beyond the big pond, is Schulhoff's music.

Maurice Ravel (1875–1937) worked during the war years on the piano cycle, **Le tombeau de Couperin**, in which he paid tribute to François Couperin, the leading proponent of clavecin music. In 1919, the composer arranged four numbers for a small orchestra.

Piano music had long been the focal point of **Schumann's** oeuvre, but his marriage to Clara in 1840 inspired him to write an unprecedented number of *Lieder*. In 1840, he composed several remarkable song cycles including **Frauenliebe und -leben**.

The music of **John Adams** (born 1947), a major contemporary American composer, is something that the players of Filharmonie Brno have "under their skin": recently they performed his *Doctor Atomic Symphony*, Chamber Symphony, City Noir and Harmonielehre. Written in 1989, **Eros Piano** is Adams's first piano concerto, inspired by Toru Takemitsu's piano concerto riverrun and Bill Evans's piano playing.

Mozart's Symphony No. 29 is one of the most interesting and polished of the many he wrote during a two-year period particularly rich in works of this genre.

Sergei Rachmaninoff (1873–1943) entered the music history books not just as composer of piano pieces but also as a symphonist, having written three numbered symphonies, the vocal symphony *The Bells*, the symphonic poems *The Isle of the Dead* and *The Rock* and the **Symphonic Dances**, an edifice weighty enough to be considered much closer to the symphony than the genre suggested by its title. It was Rachmaninoff's last great work, written in 1940 in American exile three years before the composer's death.

The combination of music by **Gustav Mahler** (1860–1911) and **Alfred Schnittke** (1934–1998) in the second half of the concert is not accidental. "The symphony as Mahler understands it must maintain its autonomy," wrote Kurt Blaukopf in his monograph, *Gustav Mahler: The Contemporary of the Future*, published in Czech in 1998. "It can, however, encompass everything that can be acquired through the techniques of working with sound. The sonata form of Viennese Classicism and Bach's polyphony, the technique of orchestra blending and Wagner's tempo modifications."

Schnittke also achieved such a synthesis. His distinctive, post-modern "polystylism" is reflected in the music for the ballet *Peer Gynt*, created by the choreographer John Neumeier after the Ibsen drama. The **Epilogue**, an "endless adagio" built as a passacaglia, whose ostinato theme is a choral piece (from a recording) and which summarises the musical and philosophical ideas of the ballet, is strong enough to stand on its own.

In 1784, the Parisian aristocrat Claude-François-Marie Rigoley, comte d'Ogny, commissioned **Joseph Haydn** (1732–1809) to write six symphonies for his concert company Le Concert de la Loge Olympique. This was how the cycle of the six so-called Paris symphonies, Nos. 82–87, came to be; they represent the first pinnacle of Haydn's oeuvre and, together with the last Mozart symphonies, also the peak of the genre in terms of form, composition and musical content. Used to programmatic music, the French gave **Symphony No. 83 in G minor** the soubriquet "The Hen", having been inspired by the dotted-rhythm motif, presented in the first movement by the oboe, that was perceived as reminiscent of a hen's cluckina.

Dmitri Shostakovich's (1906–1975) penultimate **Fourteenth Symphony** was written in 1969. It is conceived as a concise song cycle for soprano, bass and chamber orchestra, in which Shostakovich set to music the lyrics by four poets (Federico García Lorca, Guillaume Apollinaire, Wilhelm Küchelbecker and Rainer Maria Rilke) on the subject of death.

Dvořák's Violin Concerto in A minor and Sibelius's First Symphony in E minor, two important works of Czech and Finnish Romanticism respectively, will be presented by the Danish conductor Michael Schønwandt, who returns to Brno to continue the project of performing the complete Sibelius symphonies. Appearing as soloist in the Dvořák piece will be the British violinist Alexander Sitkovetsky, who collaborated with Filharmonie Brno during its autumn 2022 tour of the United Kingdom.

It was his Berlin publisher Simrock who suggested to **Antonín Dvořák** (1841–1904) that he compose his **Violin Concerto in A minor**. Whilst working, Dvořák was thinking of the celebrated soloist Joseph Joachim, whom he consulted about the solo part. The concerto eventually became an essential part of Czech violin music and a fixture in the repertoires of many significant violinists.

Jean Sibelius (1865–1957) already had several larger compositions with patriotic accents to his name when, aged 33, he found the resolve to compose his **Symphony No. 1 in E minor**. His thoughts at the time were strongly influenced by the Finnish national epic, *Kalevala*, in which he found a fount of inspiration as an emerging composer. Speaking of his numbered symphonies, however, he always stressed their autonomous nature: "My symphonies have nothing to do with Kalevala." The national character of the *First Symphony*, supported by the Romantic ideals of the period, echoes of Finnish folklore and inspiration from the distinctive Nordic landscape, is nonetheless indubitable.




